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ABSTRACTS OF DEEDS RELATING TO
CHALFORD AND COLCOMBE

Communicated by MARY A. RUDD

THE following abstracts are taken from the title deeds of the property held by Corpus Christi College, Oxford, in the ancient parish of Bisley, access to them have been kindly accorded to me by the President, Dr Allen. Nos. 1-5 are not dated, but the earliest may be placed at the latter end of the 13th century. Most of the deeds are in Latin.

The first series relates to land extending from Frith Wood to the river Frome, including College Cottage and the Company's Arms with the adjoining Woodworkers' Co.'s mill. The second series refers to land extending up Cowcombe Hill from the river. Both estates were acquired by Bishop Fox and given by him to his newly founded College.

FIRST SERIES

1. William in Campo de la Peir gives and confirms to William of Chaleford for his service and for two shillings 2 fields in Bisseley, 1 field in Trouham, 2 in Frampton and 1 in Westerhale. Witnesses: Henry of Biseleye, Peter of Chraefhale, etc.

2a. Charter of Humphrey de Boun, Count of Hereford and Essex, of lands of Frythlond¹ of Chalford.

Maria de Boun grants to William de la Fripe of Chalford the whole field called Fripelond that William of Chelkeford held of Bisseley which lies in the wood of Bysrugge² rendering 5 shillings of silver at the four terms.

W. : Henry le Eyr³ of Bysseleye, Reginald of Troham, Richard of Budefield, Radulphus Ferre, Richard of Albenasse, Walter of Pagenille. 2 seals.

2b. Inspeximus of 2a. Maria de Boun daughter of the Lord Humphrey de Boun Count of Hereford and Essex grants to William of the Frithe of Chalkford for his homage and service all that land of largesse which is called Le Frithlond which to William de Chalkford is well known and which the said William formerly held in the holding of Bysseleye which lies in the wood of Bysrugge, for rent of 5 shillings of silver. W. : William of Pagenille, Richard of Clissale, John of Chalkeforde, William of Tonlye, John 'clerico' of Frampton, Walter Sered⁴.

3. Radulphus de Mortuo Mari to William son of Hugh of Chalford for his suit and service all the land pertaining to him in Chalford together with his mills and all pertaining thereto for the annual rent of 16 shillings sterling.

3a. Copy of no. 3, witnessed amongst others by Philip de Mortuo Mari.

3b. John Frampton, 'For a grove called Peletysmede, and Frytheland'.

4. William de Chalkforde to Richard the Combare of Chalforde all his dwelling place at Chaleforde in the parish of Bisley which the said Combare held of him and the stream which there bounds his garden on the west with the water and the way which extends from his court as far as Borne for one mark of silver. Seal. W. : Richard le Eyre of Bisleye, Master Thomas of Coter, William of Lideneye, Peter Faber of Biseruge.

5. Richard son of William Heir of Byseley confirming to William Ernste one messuage and curtilage and toft

near Pepcumbe, namely that which Belewysa la Outwebber formerly held. He gives to William that wood with the open space (area) which leads from Byseley towards the house of William de Cheliforde etc. Seal. W.: Ellis Faber of Bysrigge.

6. 'Relityaco' of John le Comber made to William Chalford, son of William Chalford of a certain mansion and curtilage in Chalford. 28 Edw. III, 1354.

7. William Chalford to Thomas Sethcombe chaplain assigning to him all his lands and tenements in Chalford, Freth hous and Pathcumbe. W: Hugo of Bysleye, Robert Stonhenge,⁵ Walter Bysrugge. 35 Edw. III, 17 May 1361.

8. Thomas Sethcombe, chaplain, to William de Chalforde and Alice his wife all his lands and tenements in Chalkford, Frethhous, and Pathcombe with mills, waters and ponds that are by the watercourses of the said mill which he had by gift and feoffment of the said William, whose heirs are William, Thomas and Walter. W: Robert Stonhenge and Walter Bysrugge. 35 Edw. III, 17 May 1359.

9. William Chalford and Walter Tristram confirm to John Frampton and Marjerie his wife 3 tenements at Chalkforde called Chalkeforde tenement and all that tenement at Colcombe within the lordship of Minchenhampton. 5 Hen. IV, 1402-3.

10. Release by Walter Tristram to John Frampton of lands and mill at Chalford. 5 Hen. IV, 1403-4.

11. Release by John Sherman to John Frampton, concerning Colcombe. Hen. IV.

12. John Frampton to John Wansford⁶ vicar of Bisley and John Solers conceding lands at Chalford and Colcombe. W: Edward Rodborough, Robert Wynestay, William Longford, Robert Bleses and others. 3 Hen. VI, 1424-5.

13. John Frampton of Chalford to John Lymerok, John Notelyn junior, William Scott of Lassebergh, Walter Hugges, and John Myllant, all his lands and tenements within the hundred of Byssley and lordship of Minchenhampton. Sealed in his court and witnessed by Edward of Rodebergh, Peter of Rodbergh, William Longforde, Robert of Monmouthe, Robert Kyngton. 6 Hen. IV, 7 June 1405. Seal, crossed hands.

[26]. Release by John Smyth Walker to John Frampton. 12 Hen. IV, 1410-11.

14. Letters of attorney of John Lymbrok concerning the deliberation of the matters of John Frampton. He appoints Thomas Fylde and Francis Halyday of Byssleye his attorneys in special commission to deal with the lands etc. of John Frampton according to the charter dated Tuesday 4 Oct. 19 Hen. VI, 1441. W: Thomas Stancombe, Thomas Breshcombe, Robert Bleas, William Knoleys, John Byell junior, Henry May, William More 'scriptore de Bristoll'. 15 Oct. 19 Hen. VI, 1441.

15. John Frampton confirms to Thomas Mull and Marjorie his wife all his lands in Bisley, with Colcombe and one toft called Vynnyse. W: Maurice Berkeley, knt, Giles Brugge and John Lymeryke. Dated at Chalford Tuesday before the feast of St. Michael Archangel 20 Hen. VI, 1441-2.

16. Indenture made at Harescombe on the vigil of St. Michael Archangel 34 Hen. VI, 1455-6, between John Mull of Harescombe esquire and Thomas Mull junior his son and John Felde of Byssley 'Polbker' (?) concerning a toft which the said Thomas Mull formerly held by gift of John Frampton.

17. Hugh Mull grants to Robert Freme of Hampton and Alice his wife a tenement called Outmore in Hampton for 10s. All houses and buildings to be repaired and maintained. Harescombe, 16 Henry VI, 1 Oct. 1458.

18. Will of Thomas Mulle, Esq. 12 March 1460. His body to be buried in Harescombe church near the middle altar

on the right part thereof. To the mother church of Worcester for tithes forgotten 12s. To Harescombe church 6s. 8*d.* To Brokethrop church 3s. 4*d.* for tithes and oblations owing. To his son William his seal of arms. To his executors 106s. 8*d.* for the maintenance of some secular priest for celebrating for his soul and those of all the faithful departed for one year in Harescombe church. To the Friars Minors, Gloucester, 2s. 6*d.* To the Carmelite brethren there 2s. 6*d.* To Augustinian brethren 2s. 6*d.* To his executors 30s. for a tomb to cover his grave with a superscription of his name and that of his wife Mary. The remainder of his goods and chattels to his executors to be disposed of for the good of his soul. John Clybs and John Arthur, executors.

19. by a good dede infeffid the seyde Walter Tristram in Yaneworthis to have and to hold etc. for ev' Also the afore rehersed Thomas Stancombe etc. and other witnesses did seyn that John Frampton infeffid John Wanesford Vicar of Bysley and John Soleys in All his landes and tents wt the apptenances that he had in Chalkford and in Colcombe to haue and to holde to them and to ther eyres and to their Assignes for ev' and by a good dede made to them lengry (?) to the intent that they or theyr eyres scholde make astate of all the seyde landis and tentis wt all other apptenances after the disesse of John Frampton and Margery his wyff to Robt Olyff and Agnes his wyff doughtr of the seyde John Frampton and to the eyres of ther to bodies lawfully begetyn Into the whiche wittnesse we afore rehersed. Thomas Stancombe etc. have putt to our seales gevyn at Bysley the xii daie of Juny the first yere of the Regne of our Sou'eyn lord king Edward the iiiith. In English. About 15 seals attached.

20. John Solers gentleman, to William Olyff, his heirs etc. release of title or claim in lands at Chalford and Colcombe. W.: John Frampton, John Castelman, John Bowman, Richard Benette, John Beley. 4 May, 2 Edw. iv, 1462.

Petition of Robert Oliffe against John Sollers of Chalford and Colcombe, 'to the Bishop of Exeter and Chancellor of England'.

Robt. Olyff late the husbonde of on Agnes late daughter to John Frampton late deceased complains that whereas John Frampton was sole seased of 3 messuages 3 mills 2 plough landes 10 acres of wode and 16 acres of mede in Chalford and Colcombe and so enfeffed one John Solers the older now dead in fee to thentent that John Solers and his heirs should after the decease of John Frampton give to Robt. Olyff and Agnes the said mills etc. of which feffment John Solers made notice to John Solers his son and died, after which decease John Solers the son entered into the premisses and the beseecher asked to be enfeffed

according to the will of John Frampton which John Solers utterly refuses. He prays for a subpoena against John Solers.

John Solers says he entered not into the said message etc. on the death of his father who made no notice to him as the said Robt. Olyff supposes. If Robt. Olyff took estate of the manor of Shipton Oliffe the lands at Chalford were not to be returned to him. His first wife Agnes died, after which Robert never took estate unto him and the said Agnes and to the heirs of their bodies of the manor of Shipton according to the deed but after the death of his first wife married another Agnes and made a feffement to certain persons of the manor of Shipton in fee and took estate thereof to him and to the said Agnes.

To this Robert Oliffe replies that John Frampton father to his first wife Agnes left the message in trust.

21. Writ of Edward IV on the petition of Robert Olife, concerning the request made . . . (see the preceding).

22. Examination by court leet at Bisley 8 Edw. IV, 1468-9. The homage present that John Frampton was seised of lands at Chalforde and Colcombe by rent to the Lady Cecily Duchess of York in fees, etc. 26s. 6d.

23. William Olyffe son and heir to Agnes formerly wife of Robert Olyff daughter and heir to John Frampton gives and concedes to princess Cecilie duchess of York, to Thomas Brugge, Esq., William Whityngton, Esq., John Gyse, Esq., Thos. Lymryk and John Mody, Esq., and Agnes his wife all the lands in Chalford and Colcombe formerly held by John Frampton for John Mody and Agnes his wife. 7 Aug. 9 Edw. IV, 1469-70.

24. William Oliff to Thomas Bruggs, William Whityngton, and others and to John Mody and Agnes his wife all lands in Chalford and Colcombe in the fief of the head lord. W : Thomas Whityngton, John Bowman, Richard Benet, John Castleman, John Butte. 7 Aug. 9 Edw. IV.

25. Quitclaims of William Olyff to John Mody of all his rights in the above lands and mill. 12 Aug. 9 Edw. IV, 1470.

27. John Mody of Colleborne, to Edward More formerly of Rodborough Tolbker (?). Concedes all the messuage toft mill dovecot lands etc. within the lordship of Bysseleth etc. called Chalford and Colcombe, at a yearly rent of 48s. 3d. To the lord of Bysselegh 26s. 3d. and to the lord of Mynchinhampton 5s. 6d. 12 Edw. IV, 1474-5.

28. Recovery by John Mody of lands etc. in 27. 12 Edw. IV.

29. Indenture between John Mody and John Gryme, mentioning a toking mill with a grist mill.

30. Indenture between John Mody and John Gryme made at Malmesbury on the feast of St. Michael, 1 Ric. III, 1483.

A due reckoning and account as to arrears of rent for a tenement in Chalford which John Gryme holds. He owes £22 5s. of which sum he is to pay 36s. at the next feast of Easter and after the feast of the exaltation of the blessed cross etc. On failure to pay, John Mody or his assigns may distrain.

31. Manor court papers.

(a). Court held before Thomas Whytyngton, Thomas Baynan custos, justices of the peace, Glos. John Mody of Malmesbury and Edward Mody formerly of the same expelled Edward Mull from their tenement namely, 4 messuages, 1 water mill, 1 fulling mill, 200 acres etc. of land. 1 Henry VII, 1485-6.

(b). John Mody of Malmesbury and Edmund Mody complain that several malefactors, robbers and unknown disturbers of the king's peace came with swords batolis bows and arrows, shields, jakkes, salettes and with other arms of defense on Tuesday after the feast of Corpus Christi 1 Hen. VII to Edmund Mull at Chalford and killed 2 and took 3 of Walter Sherman's 'sherys' of the value of 30 shillings of the goods and chattels of Edmund Mull.

(c). Edmund Mull and Christopher Hillrow, complaint against John Mody and Edmund regarding expulsion mentioned above.

32. Reply of John Mody and Edmund Mody to Edmund Myll by Simon Haryngton, attorney, concerning aggressions against the king that they came with force and arms. They recite that Robert Olyffe was 'debitus' of the said lands and tenements and was succeeded by Wm. Olyff his son and heir. They were let to John Mody now defunct. Edward Mull claimed the same, etc.

33. Petition of Thomas Mull to the Duke of York reciting that he holds Chalford mill in the lordship of Bisley at a rent of 16s. yearly and that of late the duke's officers charge him for the use of the waters thereto a black ewe and a black lamb, and a further 18*d.* for 'non closir' of a hedge at Bisley Grove. He asks that the matter shall be committed to the duke's 'lernyd counsell'. Undated.

34. Bond between John and Edmund Mody and Edmund Mull for an 'arbiterment'.

35. Descent of the Colcombe land.

John Colcombe sold his to William at Bourne psh Minchinhampton.

A messuage and a yardland of arrable grounde wth a curtilage and a croft adjoyning it with all that appurtenance in the honour and felde of Colcombe in the parish of Minchinhampton which place is called Voynst place and an acre of arrable grounde which is called Swardut acre and a half acre in my croft which once was Harry Holles.

Alice sometime wife of Walter Willus of Colcombe gave to Willm of Chalford for his service foure acres of . . . ground in Colcombe with the appurtenance whereof one acre lyeth betwene the parson's grounde of Hampton and the ground which once did belong to Osbert and Vrystin and halfe an acre lyeth at Colheme perilte of the south part and halfe an acre lyeth by Colheme and hiviher waye

on the south part halfe an acre lying betwene. And one acre lying in longe furlonge next the parson's grounde of Hampton on the south part And one other acre lyeth in the east part of the waye at Gatecumbe sheueds nere to Robert Benets ground in the east part.

John Framton of Chalford hath gevin to Thomas Mull and Margerrie his wife a messuage called Colcombe with all the appurtinences thereof within the lordship of Minchinhampton and hath given all his state which he had in a toft called Ayenyugge.

Lyonell Novice and Anne his wife did demise to Willm Compton and Elizabeth his wife and Walter his sonne all that which is called Chalford and Colcombe lying in the parishes of Bysley and Minchinhampton for them to hold in as ample wise as one John Gryme did, and one Robert Twisle gentleman.

Willm le Bruther the son and heire of Elie le Bruther of Colcombe gave to Johis Jordan of Colcombe all that messuage with a curtilage and a croft adioyning to it within the manner of Minchinhampton which messuage is set betwene the house of Willm Gregore of Colcombe and the house of Harry de la Marvelle (Maple).

Walter Tristram gave to Willm Chalford and Alice his wife all his groundes and tenements wth thappurtinences called Mapeldenemead within the parish of Minchinhampton.

Johis Jorden of Colcombe gave to Willus le Bruther the sonne of Elie le Bruther all that his messuage with a curtilage and a toft adioyninge to it which is set between the house of Willm Gregorie of Colcombe and the house of Harry de la Maple.

A meadow within the manner of Bysley called Rodhome.

36. Indenture 26 February 7 Henry VIII, 1516, between (1) Lionel Norris and Anne his wife, (2) William Compton and Elizabeth his wife and (3) Walter⁷ son of William and Elizabeth Compton. Lease of lands⁸ in Bisley and

Minchinhampton, formerly held by John Gryme⁹ and Robert Twyssel, at a yearly rent of 5 marks.

NOTES

⁷ William Compton died seized of the manor of Throggham in 1546, his wife Elizabeth surviving him. Will proved 3 November. (P.C.C. Alen, fo. 19). He was buried in the south aisle of Bisley church to which he left bequests. His daughter Margery married Edmund Webb, and his daughter Alice . . . Heskynnes. Walter Compton his son received a grant of the revenues of the chantry of the Blessed Virgin of Bisley in 1548 and was high sheriff of Gloucestershire in 1576. The Comptons were of the family of the earls of Northampton and bore for arms—*sable, a lion passant guardant in fess, or, between 3 helmets, close beavered argent.*

⁸ The messuage called Chalford place.* is now known as the Company's Arms. Whilst the back part of the house may be of late Tudor origin the front part is a fine example of the time of James II, though recently much spoilt by a modern addition. A mill of Tudor date stands near the bridge over the canal and must have been erected by the Comptons. The messuage and mill together with the Old House, recently destroyed, and 11 acres of land, were sold by the College in 1872.

Lease by Corpus Christi College to William Compton of Bisley of Challyford place, fulling mill, grist mill, etc. formerly held by John Grimes, with another messuage in Colcombe and 60 acres of arable land, for a term of 70 years at a rent of £3 6s. 8d. Provision is made that William Compton shall not cut down any trees. 4 October 16 Henry VIII, 1524.

Fo. 96. Licence granted to William Compton to assign his lease to Thomas Wymar his servant, for 20 years. 1 July, 38 Henry VIII, 1546.

Fo. 100. Licence granted to Walter Compton, son of William, to assign an undertenant of the messuage formerly leased to his father. 11 May, 2 Edw. vi.

Book 2, fo. 88. Licence to Francis Compton, son of Walter, for the assignment of the lease to William Hopton of Leonard Stanley, clothier. 11 July, 6 Eliz. 1568.

⁹ John Grymes died in 1509-10, his will being proved 14 February. He was buried in the churchyard of Bisley and left 3s. to the church, 12*d.* to the torches, and 20*d.* to the service of the chantry of St. Mary of Bisley. (P.C.C. Bunnett 25).

37. Acquittance of William Morwent of Hartpury, Glos., to Thomas Greneway President of Corpus Christi College, Oxford for a lease in reversion of a messuage in Chalford. 21 May, 6 Eliz. 1564.

(*b, c*). Receipts of William Morwent for payments received from Corpus Christi College, 20 May 1564.

SECOND SERIES

Undated, but probably 13th century.

1. Elias de Chaleforde gives to Walter de Colecombe one acre of his land lying at Rudyborne 'in escamibro viii' with land in the valley 'called of me Repe' next the wood of Westleye. W: John of Chalforde, Wm. of Chalforde, John Faber, John of Frampton.

2. Hugh of Colecombe grants to Elye son of William de la Frythe of Chalforde all his lands in Colcombe. W: John Achard.

3. Release of Robert de Leuneseg Dom. Whyr and Agnes de Longforde his wife to Hugo son of Thomas in le Wode and Alice his wife and Katina de Tymbhulle sister of the aforesaid Alice all right which he has in land which William le Gruthe held in Colcombe. W: Walter Forwode, John of Chalforde, Robert of Stonehenge.

4. Alicia wife of Walter William of Colcombe confirms to William of Chalford for 14s. and his service her lands in Colcombe. John of Frampton, chev. a witness.

5. Release by John of Chalforde to Henri Attemapele of a messuage. Mentions a court of the Abbess de Cadamo of Mynchenehampton. Rent 1 mark per annum. 20 Edw. III, 1291-2.

6. Walter William lets his lands at Colcombe to William of Chalford for 14s.

7a. John Jordan of Colcombe gives and confirms to William le Brutcher son of Elie le Brutcher and Agnes his wife lands between the house of Wm. Gregory of Colcombe and the house of Henry de la Mapele, which had been held by Elie father to William aforesaid, to hold them of the chief lord of the fee. W: Thomas of Rodebwe, Adam Spileman, Richard of Nailesworthe, John of Chalforde, John Genett, Ric. Kynne, Alan of Forwode, Richard Myblank, Robert of Stonhengge.

7b. John of Chalforde releases Richard de la Frithe of Colcombe from lands in Colcombe which Richard held by brief of the lord king of the right of peace in the court of the Abbess of Cadamo of Minchenhampton, John being subject to restrictions as to sale. Richard pays 5 marks yearly. 20 Edw. I, 1291-2.

8. Hugh of Calfawe son of Thomas in le Wode and Alice his wife confirms to William son of Henry of Chalkford and Agnes his wife the land which William le Bruther held at Colcombe. W: Hugh of Byseleye Robert of Stonhenge, John of Fromptone, Richard Kynne, John of Avenynge, Wm. of Forwode, John Jordan, Wm. of Grenehull.

9. Katrina of Tymberhulle grants to William son of Henry of Chalford and Agnes his wife all her interests in the land which William le Brutcher held at Colcombe. W: John of Avenynge, Richard Kynne, William of Forwode, Robert of Stonhenge, John Jordan, William of Grenehull, William Fag, Ellis of Bysrug.

10. Henry of Chalkforde confirms to William his son and Agnes daughter of Richard Kynne of Munchenehampton all his land at Colcombe which Ellis son of

William de la Frithe of Chalkeforde held by gift and feoffment of Hugh of Byseleye called Roedhomme. W : John of Avesleye, John of Avenyng, Hugh of Byseleye, John of Frompton, John of Chalkforde, William of Forwode, Alexander of Avenyng, Richard Cok, Thomas of Horstone, Robert of Stonhenge.

11. William le Brutcher son and heir of Elie le Brutcher of Colcomb gives to John Jordan of Colcombe the messuage that Ellis his father held at Colcombe, which messuage stands between the house of William Gregory of Colcumbe and the house of Henry de la Mapele. W : Richard Kynnes, Alan of Forwode, John Benett, John of Chalforde, Richard Cok, Richard Miblack, Robert Clerico. 33 Edw. I, 1304-5.

12. John Colcombe of Tonle gives to William atte Borne of Mynchenehampton the messuage etc. in Colcombe, which is called Voynsplace and one acre called Swarde acre and half an acre in his croft which sometime was Henry Hulle's. 5 Edw. III, 1331-2.

13. Release by William Trenhulle son and heir of Hugh Trehulle of Colcombe to Wm. Chalkforde of all his interest in a tenement called Salemones in Colcombe. 33 Edw. III, 1359-60.

14. Walter Tristram gives and concedes to William Chaleford and Alice his wife his lands called Mapeldene-mead within the parish of Hampton Moniali. 44 Edw. III, 1370-1.

15. Indenture between Wm. Chalford and Alice his wife to Walter Tristram and Isabella his wife conceding lands etc. in Byseley and Hampton Moniale, Walter and Alice to have the croft called Longcroft, with Pikatteshey, le Stonyruydyng, le Soweruydyngge le Hale, and two acres of land in 'campis' of Byseley. Walter and Alice have in Minchinhampton one court (*aulam*) with garden and six acres of land. Rent 31s. W : Hugh of Byseley, Richard Monmouth, Thomas Freem.
