of Parry**

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THE HILLIER FAMILY OF CIRENCESTER FROM
1635 TOGETHER WITH THE FAMILY OF PARRY
AND SUPPLEMENT

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THE history of a County is, in no small degree, made up of its divers families. In the course of past years I have collected materials for the history of three Cirencester families—Dix, Hillier, and Roberts. In the present narrative I give the history of the second of these, the Hillier family, two of whom took wives from the Dix family, and another of whom married the Rev. Joshua Parry, becoming thereby the grandmother of the famous Arctic navigator and explorer Sir William Edward Parry, and the ancestress of his almost equally illustrious descendants, including the Captain of H.M.S. *Achilles*, famed for its part in the battle of the River Plate in December 1939, which heralded the end of the German battleship *Graf Spee*.

In the course of the article there are references to 34 families, namely :—Alexander, Ashmead or Ashmeade, Baily, Baylie, Blackman, Brewer, Cam, Chandler, Collier, Cowslade, Daly, De Ranghiaschi Brancalone, Dix, Dobson, Fremantle, Graham, Graves, Hawkins, Hillier, Hoare, Hobhouse, King, Moore, Parry, Phillips, Rigby, Roberts, Smith (two separate families), Spencer, Timbrell, Vaughan, Wheeler, and Williams, and, in addition, to the following eleven surnames : Belsham, Blount, Bush, Franklin, Freeman, Gurnee, Henness, Mace, Tyssen, Wiffin *alias* Peters, Soms (? Somes) and Wishaw.

* The *Dictionary of National Biography* mentions a John Hillier, steward of the manor of Cirencester, who is said to have died in 1685 leaving a will. The will has not been seen.

GENERATION I

RICHARD HILLIER (1) born presumably *c.* 1635, married in or before 1658 — *née* — (2), by whom he had issue at least two if not three sons, and probably also a daughter all of whom presently.

This Richard Hillier had probably a brother, Thomas Hillier (3) who before 1673, and probably before 1666 married Elizabeth *née* — (4), by whom he had issue (*see 3 below*).

GENERATION II

Issue of Richard Hillier (1) and — née — his wife (2)

(i) RICHARD HILLIER (5), bap. at CPC on 18 Feb. 1658-9. He died early in 1711-12 and was buried at CPC or churchyard on 16 Jan. 1711-12. By his Will, dated 18 Dec. 1711 he described himself as Richard Hillier the elder of Cirencester, yarnmaker. He bequeathed 'unto my dearly loved wife Mary Hillier' (6) £80; 'unto my son Richard Hillier (14) £15 over and besides what I have already actually given him' and I give unto his two children Richard (31) and Hannah (32) Hillier one guiney in gold a piece; unto my son Caleb Hillier (16) £115; unto my son Anthony Hillier (20) £120 to be paid unto him on his reaching 21; unto my son William Hillier (18) £125 to be paid unto him on his reaching 21; unto my daughter Mary Hillier (22) £105 to be paid unto her on her reaching 21; unto my daughter Elizabeth Hillier (24) £125. Further he bequeathed unto 'my said son Caleb Hillier (16), my brother William Hillier (7), Thomas Mace, Thomas Dix junior, and Henry Mifflin, *als* Peters junior, £100 upon trust to lay out the same on an annuity or yearly rent charge or leasehold estate for the life of my said daughter Mary (22) for her sole benefit and behoofe over and above the aforesaid £105 before given to her. There followed provisions as to his household goods and his residue which need not be set out. He appointed his son Caleb (16)

' full and sole executor ' and he appointed the 2nd, 3rd 4th, and 5th of the five trustees as overseers, bequeathing to each of them five shillings for their ' care and pains to be taken herein '.

Will proved at Gloucester 2 Aug. 1712. He married *c.* 1683 Mary *née* — (6) who was living 18 Dec. 1711, and there was issue (*see* 5, *below*).

(ii) WILLIAM HILLIER (7). He was living (appointed a trustee and overseer of the Will of his said brother Richard Hillier (5), 18 Dec. 1711). He was buried at CPC or CPCY on 16 Dec. 1714

He married *c.* 1684 Mary, *née* — (8) who was buried at CPC or CPCY on 9 March 1713-14; and there was issue (*see* 7, *below*).

(iii) Probably also a daughter, Mary *née* Hillier (9), who died unmarried and was buried at CPC or CPCY on 18 May 1713.

Issue of Thomas Hillier (3) (of Generation I) and Elizabeth née — his wife (4)

In the second, third and fourth of the following four baptisms (all of which took place at CPC), the mother's Christian name—Elizabeth—appears as well as the father's.

(i) ANNE *née* Hillier (10), *bap.* (as ' fil. Thomas Hillier ' ; writing difficult to read) 30 July 1666. She would appear to have died young.

(ii) ELIZABETH *née* Hillier (11) *bap.* 10 June 1674.

(iii) ANNE *née* Hillier (12), *bap.* 15 Feb. 1675-6, and buried at CPC (as ' Anne daughter of Thomas Hillier ') 19 April 1696.

(iv) SUSANNA *née* Hillier (13), *bap.* 5 Aug. 1679.

GENERATION III

Issue of Richard Hillier (5) (of Generation II) and Mary (6) née —, his wife

These are in the order in which I think they should respectively be given.

(i) RICHARD HILLIER (14), bap. at CPC 29 May 1684. He was clearly the eldest son and probably the eldest child. He was living 18 December 1711 and probably died before 6 Jan. 1735-6.

He married in or before 1709 — *née* — (15) by whom he had issue (*see* Generation IV).

(ii) CALEB HILLIER (16), bap. at CPC 23 Oct. 1686. He died on 27 Sept. 1753 aged 67 and was buried in BGPC, Cirencester on 30 Sept. 1753. MI to him there:

' In this place are interred the remains of Caleb Hillier, whose excellent character will long be remembered, without the help of an inscription. He exchanged this life for a better Sep. 27 1753 in the 68th year of his age'.

By his Will dated 5 July 1753 he described himself as Caleb Hillier of Cir. co. Gloucester* woolstapler and he bequeathed certain lands to trustees, namely Thomas Bush of Cirencester, esquire, John Roberts of the same place, ironmonger, and William Hillier (45), of the same place, woolstapler, in trust for his daughter Susanna (42) for life, with remainder to her heirs and in default of issue for his daughter Sarah (43), wife of the Revd. Mr Joshua Parry (44) and in default to his nephew Mr William Hillier (45) subject to an annuity of £40 for his (the Testator's) wife (17).

It will be seen later that Susanna (42) became the wife of William (45).

The testator made contingent bequests to his nephews, Richard (49), Anthony (51), and Thomas (53) Hillier. He also made a bequest to Hannah (60), daughter of John Ashmead (34), of Gloucester and mentioned daughters of his brothers Richard (14) and William Hillier (18).

He appointed as his executors Thomas Bush, John Roberts and William Hillier (45).

His Will was proved in PCC (292 Searle) on 27 Nov. 1753, and it was recorded on the Will that he died on 27 Sept. 1753.

* He also owned estates at Upcott, Devon, and Wittington, Glos.

He married at CPC on 27 April 1714 Mary *née* Brewer (17) born *c.* 1683. She was probably a relative of Joseph Brewer, born probably before 1691, periwig maker and victualler, who married Sarah, *née* —, which latter died 6 Dec. 1767, aged 76, and was buried in BGPC on 8 Dec. 1767. MI to her there, and her husband's description in the Chapel Register.

She died 10 March 1760, aged 77, and was buried in BGPC (as 'Mrs Mary Hillier, who died the 10 about 5 in the morning, aged 77') 13 March 1760-1.

There was issue of such marriage (*see* 16 *below*).

(iii) WILLIAM HILLIER (18), born (say) *c.* 1692. He died in August 1750 and was buried in CPC on 22 Aug. 1750.

By his Will dated 18 Aug. 1750—wherein he described himself as William Hillier of Cirencester, co. Gloucester, woolstapler—he bequeathed 'to my son William (45), a house called Staple Ho. Withington and a house in Coxwell St., Cirencester', and all his library there except such books as belonged to his late brother Anthony Hillier (20). He bequeathed:—to my son William (45), £1000; to my son Richard (49), £1500; to my son Anthony (51), £1800; to my son Thomas (53), £1500; to my daughter Elizabeth (47), £1000; to my daughter Mary (54), £1000; to my daughter Susannah (46), £1000. He bequeathed to Mr Joshua Parry (44), £5 5s. *od*; and to Caleb (16), to Mr Joseph Freeman and to Mr John Roberts (hereinafter referred to on page 233), £10 10s *od* each. He appointed as executors:—Caleb Hillier (16), Jos. Freeman, J. Roberts, and William Hillier (45) his son.

Will proved at London in PCC (297 Greenly) on 12 Sept. 1750; and the testator was recorded on the Will as having died in August 1750.

He married in or before 1729 or 1730, Elizabeth *née* Dix (19), second daughter and fourth child of Thomas Dix of Cirencester, ironmonger, whose Will dated 24 April

1742 was proved in PCC (188 Anstis) on 4 August 1744, and a granddaughter of Thomas Dix of Cirencester the elder, whose Will dated 6 January 1709-10 was proved at Gloucester on 11 April 1713. She predeceased her husband, dying in September 1740, and was buried in CPC on 11 September 1740. Both are commemorated in the MI in the BGPC to Thomas Hillier, one of their children. See Generation IV (53).

There was issue of their marriage, see 18 below.

(iv) ANTHONY HILLIER (20) who was living on 18 December 1711 (then under 21). He was buried at CPC or CPCY on 5 June 1748.

By his Will, dated 5 February 1747—wherein he described himself as 'of Cirencester, co. Gloucester, woolstapler',—he made bequests to his brother Caleb Hillier (16); his brother William Hillier (18), and his sister Elizabeth Hillier (24); to Mrs Abigail Smith, £20; to Mrs Susannah Roberts, £10; to my cousins (*sic*, but probably, meaning nieces), Mary Dix, Sarah Dix, Elizabeth Dix and Ann Dix (daughters of his wife's brother, Thomas Dix of Cirencester, clothier, then deceased); to my cousin (*sic* but probably meaning niece) Susannah Hillier (35) or (42) or (46); to my cousin (*sic* probably meaning niece) Elizabeth Hillier (36) or (47); to Mary (59), Hannah (60) and Susannah (61) Ashmeade'. He appointed as executors his brothers William (18) and Caleb (16) Hillier.

Will proved at London in PCC (202 Strahan) on 5 July 1748 by William Hillier (18) power reserved to Caleb Hillier (16) to prove it likewise.

He married, before 8 April 1732, Hannah *née* Dix (21) born *c.* 1704, one of the sisters of the Elizabeth *née* Dix (19) who had married his brother William Hillier (18) and, fourth daughter and sixth child of the first above-mentioned Thomas Dix of Cirencester, ironmonger.

His wife predeceased him and was buried at CPC or CPCY on 1 February 1747-8. There would appear to have been no issue of such marriage.

(v) MARY *née* Hillier (22). Living, unmarried and under 21, on 18 December 1711. She appears—from the Will of her niece Miss Mary Hillier, one of the children of her brother Richard Hillier (5), 6 January 1735-6 and hereinafter more particularly referred to, leaving a legacy 'to my aunt Timbrell' and witnessed by John Timbrell and Henry Timbrell—to have married — Timbrell (23).

In passing I may mention that one John Timbrell the younger of Cirencester, mercer, was on 29 February 1768 a co-deponent concerning the execution of the Will of Benjamin Gurnee (c. 1692-1768), of Cirencester, yarn-maker, dated 8 January 1767 and proved PCC (153 Secker) 27 April 1768. Benjamin Gurnee had died 13 February 1768, aged 76, and was buried in BGPC; MI to him there describing him as 'a liberal benefactor to the Society', i.e. the Presbyterian Chapel at Cirencester.

Of the possible issue of such marriage, *see* 22 *below*.

(vi) ELIZABETH *née* Hillier (24), born c. 1696. Living unmarried and under 21 on 18 December 1711. She died 22 May 1756, unmarried, and was buried in BGPC (as 'Mrs' *sic* 'Elizabeth Hillier, single woman, aged 60') on 27 May 1756. MI to her there as follows:—'Underneath lieth the body of Elizabeth Hillier, spinster, the daughter of Richard and Mary Hillier the elder. She died the 22 of May 1756, aged 60'.

Issue of William Hillier (7) (of Generation II) and Mary née —, his wife (8).

(i) WILLIAM HILLIER (25), bap. CPC 12 October 1685, and buried at CPC 4 February 1685-6.

(ii) MARY *née* Hillier (26), buried at CPC 27 September 1686.

(iii) WILLIAM HILLIER (27), bap. at CPC 11 August 1687, and buried at CPC 11 January 1687-8.

(iv) WILLIAM HILLIER (28), bap. at CPC 3 July 1689.

(v) MARY *née* Hillier (29), buried at CPC 5 February 1691-2.

(vi) — (sex unstated) HILLIER (30), buried at CPC as a 'still born' child, 7 February 1692-3.

GENERATION IV

*Issue of Richard Hillier (14) (of Generation III) and —
née —, his wife (15).*

(i) RICHARD HILLIER (31), living 18 December 1711.

(ii) HANNAH *née* Hillier (32), living (unmarried) 18 December 1711. She doubtless died young, thus giving place to another daughter of the same name.

(iii) HANNAH *née* Hillier (33), living (unmarried and under 21), and appointed sole executrix of the Will of her sister Mary *née* Hillier) 6 January 1735-6, and proved Will 5 April 1739.

She married between 6 January 1735-6 and 5 April 1739 John Ashmeade (34), clearly the John Ashmead of Gloucester already above referred to on page 215. She died in or about 1758 and before 7 June 1758. There was issue of such marriage. (*See* Generation V).

(iv) SUSANNA *née* Hillier (35), living (unmarried and under 21), 6 January 1735-6 and (unmarried) 7 June 1758.

(v) ELIZABETH *née* Hillier (36), living (unmarried and under 21), 6 January 1735-6 and (unmarried) 7 June 1758.

(vi) MARY *née* Hillier (37). She died in August 1736, and was buried at CPC or CPCY on 24 August 1736.

By her Will dated 6 January 1735-6 wherein she described herself as 'Mary Hillier of Cirencester, co. Gloucester, single woman', she bequeathed:—to her mother (15) 21s in gold; to her Aunt Timbrell (22) 21s in gold; to her uncles Caleb Hillier (16), Anthony Hillier (20), and William Hillier (18), £10 each; residue to Caleb (16), Anthony Hillier (20), in trust for her sisters Hannah Hillier (33), Susannah Hillier (35), and Elizabeth Hillier (36) on attaining 21 years. She appointed as sole executrix her sister Hannah (33).

Her Will, witnessed by John Timbrell (57) and Henry Timbrell (58), was proved PCC (81 Henchman) on 5 April 1739 by Hannah Ashmeade otherwise Hillier (33), wife of John Ashmeade (34) sister and sole executrix.

Administration de bonis non with the Will annexed was granted PCC 7 June 1758, on the death of Hannah Ashmeade (33), to Susannah (35), and Elizabeth Hillier (36).

Issue of Caleb Hillier (16) (of Generation III) and Mary née Brewer (17), his wife:—

(i) RICHARD HILLIER (38), buried CPC or CPCY 18 November 1732.

(ii) CALEB HILLIER (39), buried CPC or CPCY 18 March 1740.

(iii) JOHN HILLIER (40), buried CPC or CPCY, 10 September 1741.

(iv) WILLIAM HILLIER (41) buried CPC or CPCY 27 November 1744.

(v) SUSANNAH *née* Hillier (42). She married at CPC on 4 February 1755 (new style) her first cousin William Hillier (45) born 1729 or 1730, a son of her uncle William Hillier (18) and Elizabeth *née* Dix (19), his wife.

He died 7 April 1768, aged 38 and was buried BGPC on 12 April 1768. His death was announced in *Gentleman's Magazine*, 1768, vol. 38, p. 198:—' Wm. Hillier, Esq., of Cirencester '.

In and by his Will, dated 3 February 1768—wherein he described himself as William Hillier of Cirencester, co. Gloucester, gentleman—he recited the settlement dated 31 January 1755, made in contemplation of his marriage, of land in Withington, and that he had recently purchased a fee of land of one Gilbert Soms (? spelling) also at Withington which he gave (by his Will) to his wife for life, remainder to Manasseh King (55) of Prosbury (probably an error or miscopy for Newbury), co. Berks., in trust for his child if any, and, if none, for his brother Richard Hillier (49) for life with remainder to the use of

Joshua Parry (44) (clerk), with remainder to the use of Richard's (49) children successively.

He made bequests to his brother Anthony Hillier (51); sister Mary King (54); Ebenezer King (83), 1st son of Mary King (54); William Hillier King (84), 2nd son of the said Mary King (54). He, further, made bequests to daughters (73A, 73B) of Richard Hillier (49); Anthony Hillier (51) and Mary King (54).

He appointed as executors of his Will his wife (42), Joshua Parry (44), Mary King (54). Will proved PCC (282 Secker) on 19 July 1768 by the executors therein named. A note on the Will records that he died 7 April 1768. His wife died March 1777 and was buried in BGPC 28 March 1777. *Administration* of her estate (as 'Susannah Hillier, late of Cir., Widow deceased') was granted 22 May 1777 to Sarah Parry (43), widow natural and lawful sister and next of kin of deceased. There was, clearly, no issue of such marriage.

(vi) SARAH *née* Hillier (43). She married *c.* 1752 Rev. Joshua Parry (44), who was born in Pembrokeshire, 17 June 1719 and settled in Cirencester in 1742. He died 16 September 1776. She survived him and, dying on 25 January 1786, was buried in BGPC (as 'Mrs Parry, Relict of the late Revd. Joshua Parry: she died Jan. 25th, 86', *i.e.* 1786). There was issue of such marriage (*see* 62 *below*).

Issue of William Hillier (18) (of Generation III) and Elizabeth née Dix (19), his wife

(i) WILLIAM HILLIER (45), born *c.* 1729; died 7 April 1768, aged 38. Buried BGPC 12 April 1768.

Will dated 3 February 1768—wherein he described himself as 'William Hillier of Cirencester, co. Gloucester, Gentleman'—and was proved in PCC 19 July 1768, has already been abstracted above. He married at CPC 4 February 1755 (new style) his above-mentioned first cousin Susanna *née* Hillier (42) (the elder daughter

of his uncle Caleb Hillier of Generation III). She survived him and, dying in March 1777, was buried in BGPC 28 March 1777. Her Administration—22 May 1777—has already been mentioned. There was clearly—as already stated—no issue of such marriage.

(ii) SUSANNAH *née* Hillier (46), living 18 August 1750.

(iii) ELIZABETH *née* Hillier (47), bap. at CPC 8 November 1730. She married at CPC on 26 September 1758, Joseph Hawkins (48), of Newbury, co. Berks., who—*per* William Berry's *County Genealogies: Pedigrees of Berkshire Families*, published 1837, page 59—was the only son of Joseph Hawkins (presumably of Newbury), and Sarah *née* Pottinger his wife, and grandson of Joseph Hawkins (likewise presumably of Newbury), and great-grandson of John Hawkins (likewise presumably of Newbury) and — *née* Cowslade, his wife. Whether or not there was issue of such marriage I do not know.

(iv) RICHARD HILLIER (49), bap. at CPC 28 December 1731. Living 3 February 1768. He is probably the 'Richard Hillier, Cirencester, woolstapler', who became bankrupt in 1778.

He married *c.* 1764 Elizabeth *née* (possibly) Vaughan (50). That her maiden name may have been Vaughan is an inference from the christian name (William Vaughan) of their son. Such inference finds support from a sentence contained in a letter of which I have a copy, written from 'Cirencester, 13 August 1763' by the above-mentioned Ann *née* Roberts, one of the daughters of the above-mentioned John Roberts and Susannah *née* Dix, his wife, to her above-mentioned first cousin (who later became her husband) Thomas Smith, the only child of Rev. Skinner Smith and Abigail *née* Dix, his wife. The sentence runs:—'I am glad Mr Vaughan is coming to settle amongst us'. He may well have been her father, following her to Cirencester after her marriage.

There was issue of such marriage, *see* (51) *below*.

(v) ANTHONY HILLIER (51), bap. CPC 11 November 1733. He was living 18 August 1750 and 3 February 1768. He is, I surmise, the Anthony Hillier, Cirencester, mercer, who, as also Roger Anth. Hillier, Cirencester, mercer—became bankrupt in 1770. See *Gentleman's Magazine*, 1770, vol. 40, p. 442.

He married *c.* 1760 Mary Yernold *née* (probably) Blackman (52). That her maiden name was Blackman is an inference to be drawn from the following letter which the late Oswald Collier, Solicitor, wrote to me on 23 October 1902. The 'Eleanor' to whom he refers was Mrs Eleanor Baylie, *ob.* in 1784 or 1785, widow of Daniel Baylie, and sister of the above-mentioned Rev. Skinner Smith, and I have a copy of her letter of 13 August 1760 to which he makes reference. His own letter runs as follows:—

'I came across a curious thing a few days ago, viz. while doing a search at the Vicar-General's Office for year 1760, I found that a marriage-licence was on 7 August 1760 granted to two people whose surnames were Hillier and Blackman. I could not see the original affidavit as they are . . . at Lambeth Palace. . . . Now I think it very likely from the evidence of Eleanor's (i.e. Eleanor Baylie's) letter of 13 August 1760 that this is Anthony Hillier and Mary Yernold his wife; she says 'Mrs Hillier's wedding was in the news', and from the evidence in other letters I feel sure they were married about this time'.

Oswald Collier's family still have a Bible on the fly-leaf whereof is written:—'Mary Yearnold (*sic*) Hillier, 1779'. She was thus still living in 1779. There was issue of the marriage, *see* 51 *below*.

(vi) THOMAS HILLIER (53), bap. CPC 30 March 1735. He died 29 April 1755 and was buried in BGPC. MI to him there as follows:—Beneath this stone lieth the body of Thomas Hillier, the son of William and Elizabeth Hillier, whose bodies lie interred in the parish church here. He departed this life the 29 of April 1755.

(vii) MARY *née* Hillier (54), bap. at cpc 19 November 1736. She was living (as Mary King) 19 July 1768.

She married *c.* 1764 or 1765 Manasseh King (55) of Prosbury (probably an error or miscopy for Newbury), co. Berks., who was himself living 19 July 1768. There was issue of the marriage, *see* 54 *below*.

(viii) HANNAH *née* Hillier (56), bap. at cpc, 11 November 1737. She died, unmarried, 16 May 1763, aged 25, and was buried BGPC 20 May 1763.

Issue (possibly) of Mary née Hillier (22) (of Generation III and — Timbrell (23) her husband

(i) JOHN TIMBRELL (57). Living 6 January 1735-6.

He or his hereinafter-mentioned brother Henry Timbrell may have married and become the father of John Timbrell the younger, of Cirencester, mercer, already above-mentioned (on page 218) as having on 29 February 1768 been a co-deponent concerning the execution of the Will of Benjamin Gurnee, of Cirencester, yarnmaker.

(ii) HENRY TIMBRELL (58). Living 6 January 1735-6. See further above, under his brother John Timbrell.

GENERATION V

Issue (probably) of Hannah née Hillier (33) (of Generation IV) and John Ashmeade (34) her husband

(i) MARY *née* Ashmeade (59). Living, unmarried 5 February 1747-8.

(ii) HANNAH *née* Ashmeade (60). Living, unmarried, 5 February 1747-8. Living also ('Hannah, daughter of John Ashmeade of Gloucester') 5 July 1753.

(iii) SUSANNA *née* Ashmeade (61). Living, unmarried, 5 February 1747-8.

Issue of Sarah née Hillier (43) (of Generation IV) and the Rev. Joshua Parry (44) her husband

(i) MARY *née* Parry (62). Born at Cirencester on Sunday, 9 September 1753; bap. at cpc 15 November 1753. Died 14 January 1770 and buried BGPC 21 January 1770.

(ii) DR CALEB HILLIER PARRY (63). Born at Cirencester 21 October 1755; bap. at CPC 10 December 1755. He was described in the notice of his marriage, hereinafter referred to, as Dr Caleb Hillier Parry. He was M.A. (1778), M.D. and F.R.S, and at some time after his marriage he removed to the City of Bath, where he enjoyed a very large practice. He was also a considerable writer. He died 9 March 1822, aged 66 and was buried in Bath Abbey: MI (in Latin) to him there. A memoir of him, from the pen of his son Dr Charles Henry Parry (of whom presently) will be found in *The Lives of British Physicians* in Murray's Family Library (1830). He married c. August 1778 Sarah Rigby (64) of Norwich, as we know from the following notice in *Gentleman's Magazine* 1778, page 495, 'Dr Caleb Hillier Parry of Cirencester in Gloucestershire, to Miss Rigby of Norwich' (date of the marriage not given). There was issue of the marriage, see 63 below.

(iii) SARAH *née* Parry (65). Born at Cirencester 9 November 1756; bap. at PC there 5 January 1757. Died 16 January 1760, and buried BGPC 20 January 1760.

(iv) SUSANNAH *née* Parry (66). Born at Cirencester 26 July 1758; bap. at PC 20 September 1758. Died 24 January 1760 and buried in BGPC 29 January 1760.

(v) SARAH THEODORA *née* Parry (67). Born at Cirencester 13 February 1760; bap. at PC 27 May 1760. Died 19 November 1760, and buried at BGPC 23 November 1760.

(vi) GEORGE FREDERICK PARRY (68). Born at Cirencester 13 February 1761; bap. at PC 30 April 1761.

(vii) JOHN PARRY (69). Born at Cirencester 19 August 1763; bap. at PC 14 November 1763. Died 20 January 1772, and buried in BGPC 26 January 1772.

(viii) SOPHIA *née* Parry (70). Born at Cirencester 27 June 1765; bap. at PC 3 August 1765. Died 26 May 1785, and buried in BGPC ('Ag.: 19'), 2 June 1785.

(ix) AMELIA *née* Parry (71). Born at Cirencester 11 December 1767; bap. at PC there 17 June 1768.

She married in April 1793, as 2nd wife, Sir Benjamin Hobhouse, Bart. (72), born 1757, son and heir of John Hobhouse of Westbury College, co. Gloucester, the elder son and heir of Benjamin Hobhouse, who was born in 1682, and of Mary *née* Spragge his wife. He was a member of Parliament 1797-1818 and was created a Baronet on 22 December 1812 and he died 15 August 1831.

From letters, copies of which are in my possession, he appears to have been a brewer and a great friend of one of the Royal Dukes ('The D. of C. '), and to have had aspirations to a peerage, and he was a great friend of the Thomas Smith, J.P., and Eliza (or Elizabeth) *née* Chandler his wife, of Easton Grey, co. Wilts.

Sir Benjamin had earlier married Charlotte *née* Cam, daughter and heiress of Samuel Cam of Chantry House, co. Wilts, by whom he had had issue four children, three sons and a daughter, the eldest son being John Cam Hobhouse, 2nd Baronet, who was created a Baron, as Lord Broughton in 1851; a barony since extinct.

His second wife was apparently living 23 July 1826, and he had further issue by her (*see* 71 *below*).

Issue of Richard Hillier (49) (of Generation IV) and Elizabeth née (probably) Vaughan (50), his wife.

WILLIAM VAUGHAN HILLIER (73). Born at Cirencester 3 April 1765; bap. at PC 11 April 1765. He died 22 April 1765 and was buried at BGPC 25 April 1765.

Issue of Anthony Hillier (51) (of Generation IV) and Mary Yernold née (probably) Blackman (52), his wife.

(i) WILLIAM HILLIER (74). Born at Cirencester 17 May 1761; bap. at PC 24 May 1761. He died 28 May 1761 and was buried at BGPC 30 May 1761.

(ii) MARY COLLY, *née* Hillier (75). Born at Cirencester 24 April 1762; bap. at PC 24 June 1762.

(iii) RICHARD HILLIER (76). Born at Cirencester 22 July 1764; bap. at PC 12 April 1765. He or his

younger brother Thomas Colly Hillier (81) must have married — *née* — (77) and there was issue (*see* 76 and 82 *below*).

(iv) HARRIET DORREL *née* Hillier (78). Born at Cirencester 17 December 1766; bap. at PC 21 January 1767. She died 18 June 1771, aged 4½ years, and was buried at BGPC 23 June 1771.

(v) ANN COLLY *née* Hillier (79). Born *c.* 1768–1770. Baptism not found. She lived at Clifton, co. Somerset, and died there, unmarried, in or shortly before 1840.

In and by her will, dated 13 December 1838, wherein she described herself as ‘Ann Colly Hillier of the Parish of Clifton in the Borough of Bristol, spinster’, and which was some 72 folios in length, she mentioned a great number of persons (mostly, I think, friends), and appointed as her executors and trustees:—‘my cousin Charles Smith of Marston Maisey, co. Wilts. gentleman, and my friend Syngé Blount of Birmingham, Surgeon’; spoke of her freehold land situate at Bodenham and Bromyard co. Hereford, and gave legacies to four nephews:— Benjamin Franklin Hillier (104), John Langdon Hillier (105), Thomas Colly Hillier (106) and William Hillier (107). The Will which was witnessed by John Franklin, Solicitor, and Thomas Henness, Clerk, was proved PCC by the two executors on 23 April 1840.

The said Charles Smith, whom she so described as ‘my cousin’, is the Charles Smith hereinafter referred to on page 237. He was a *second* cousin of such Testatrix.

(vi) SUSANNA *née* Hillier (80). Born 24 March 1770; bap. CPC 22 April 1770.

(vii) THOMAS COLLY HILLIER (81). Born 26 June 1771; bap. at CPC 6 July 1771. He or his elder brother Richard Hillier (76) must have married — *née* — (77), and there was issue (*see* 76 and 82 *below*).

Issue of Mary née Hillier (54) (of Generation IV) and Manasseh King (55) her husband.

(i) EBENEZER KING (82), first son, living 3 February 1768.

(ii) WILLIAM HILLIER KING (83), second son, living 3 February 1768.

GENERATION VI

Issue of Dr Caleb Hillier Parry (63) (of Generation V) and Sarah née Rigby, his wife (64).

(i) DR CHARLES HENRY PARRY (84). Born 3 July 1779; bap. CPC 21 September 1779, died 1860. He became an accomplished physician at Bath and a writer. He was author of *inter alia*, a Memoir of his grandfather, the Rev. Joshua Parry (44) (for whom see above), which was edited after his death by Sir John E. Eardley-Wilmot, Bart., and published in London in 1872; he married Emma Mary née Besford (84A) (d. 1872). They had issue 7 daughters, names not given.

(ii) SIR WILLIAM EDWARD PARRY, F.R.S. (85), Knight—more generally known as Sir Edward Parry—the Arctic explorer and navigator. He was born at Bath on 19 December 1790 and died (at Ems, I believe) on 7 July 1855. He married firstly, October 1826, the Hon. Isabella Louisa Stanley (86), and secondly, in 1841 Catherine Edwards Hankinson (86A) and there was issue, see Generation VII.

(iii) MARIA née Parry (85A), (1781–1849), married Rev. Thomas Garnier (1776–1873), Dean of Winchester.

(iv) ELIZABETH EMMA née Parry (85B), (1789–1818), married Sir John Eardley-Wilmot.

(v) CAROLINE BRIDGET née Parry (85C), (1792–1859), married Joseph Martineau (1786–1863).

(vi to ix) Four other sons and daughters, names not given)

Issue of Amelia née Parry (71) (of Generation V) and Sir Benjamin Hobhouse, Bart. (72), her husband.

(i) EDWARD ISAAC HOBHOUSE (87). He married on 4 January 1832, the Hon. Hester Charlotte née Graves (88), fifth, but fourth surviving daughter of the second

Lord Graves, and died 16 May 1854. There was issue, *see* Generation VII.

(ii) THOMAS BENJAMIN HOBHOUSE (89). Born 1807. Barrister-at-Law. He died 3 January 1877.

(iii) AMELIA *née* Hobhouse (90), married in 1841 Thomas Daly (91), son of Dominick Daly of Galway. She died 18 January 1860.

(iv) SOPHIA ELIZABETH *née* Hobhouse (92) married on 17 January 1828 Boyd Alexander (93), a younger son of Alexander of Ballochmyle, and died 19 October 1859.

(v) HARRIET THEODORA *née* Hobhouse (94), married on 27 May 1823 The Right Rev. George Trevor Spencer (95), Bishop of Madras and afterwards Chancellor of St. Paul's, and died 16 July 1866.

(vi) JULIA *née* Hobhouse (96) married on 21 July 1830 The Rev. C. S. Moore (97) and died before 1878.

(vii) SARAH MATILDA *née* Hobhouse (98) married in May 1727 the Marchese de Ranghiaschi Brancaleone (99) and died before 1878.

(viii) JOANNA *née* Hobhouse (100) married the Rev. F. S. A. Fane (101).

(ix) — *née* Hobhouse (102), youngest daughter. She is not mentioned in Sir Bernard Burke's *Peerage and Baronetage* 1878, but her existence is known to me from a letter written by the Rev. Thomas Belsham (1750–1829) who was minister of the Essex Street Chapel from 1805–1829 and for whose life reference may be made to the *Dictionary of National Biography*. The letter, of which I have a copy, was dated from Essex Street 17 October 1817 and was written to the wife of the above-mentioned Thomas Smith, of Easton Grey, J.P. The passage in question runs as follows:—

' Oct. 18. I am very sorry for Sir Benjamin and Lady Hobhouse. The death of their youngest daughter must have been a great and sad surprise. I hope however that Harriet is likely to recover. I have not yet had it in my power to call at Manchester Buildings '.

This youngest daughter, therefore, died in or about October 1817.

Issue of either Richard Hillier (76) (of Generation V) or his younger brother Thomas Colly Hillier (82)

(i) BENJAMIN FRANKLIN HILLIER (103), living 13 December 1838.

(ii) JOHN LANGDON HILLIER (104), living 13 December 1838.

(iii) THOMAS COLLY HILLIER (105), living 13 December 1838.

(iv) WILLIAM HILLIER (106), living 13 December 1838.

GENERATION VII

Issue of Sir William Edward Parry (85) (of Generation VI) and the Hon. Isabella Louisa née Stanley (86), his wife.

(i) THE RIGHT REV. EDWARD PARRY (107), Bishop Suffragan of Dover. Born 1830; died 1890. He married Matilda née Williams (108), daughter of Benjamin Williams of Hillingdon, co. Middlesex, and there was issue (*see below*).

(ii) LUCY née Parry (107A), (1831-1906), married Admiral Robert Coote (1820-1898).

(iii) COMMANDER CHARLES PARRY, R.N. (107B), (1833-1868).

(iv) CAROLINE née Parry (107C), (1837-1927), married Rev. John Hugh Way, of Henbury, Bristol.

(v to x) Six other sons and daughters, names not given.

Issue of Sir William Edward Parry (85) and Catharine Edwards née Hankinson (1808-1896).

(xi) KATHARINE née Parry (109), (1844-1929). She married Brodie Hoare (110), nephew of Lady Maria Brodie, who was a widow by 13 May 1899. Twin of

(xii) ELIZABETH née Parry (107D), (1844-1910), married Edward Estridge (1843-1919).

(xiii) WILLIAM EDWARD PARRY (107E), (1845-1861).

Issue of Edward Isaac Hobhouse (87) (of Generation VI) and The Hon. Hester Charlotte née Graves (88), his wife.

AUGUSTUS STEWART HOBHOUSE (III), born 23 April 1833.

GENERATION VIII

Issue of The Right Rev. Edward Parry (107) (of Generation VII) and Matilda née Williams (108), his wife.

(i) THE MOST REV. EDWARD ARCHIBALD PARRY (II2), D.D. Born 1860, died 1942, Archbishop of the West Indies, 1917-1921.

(ii) SIR FREDERICK SYDNEY PARRY (II3), K.B.E. (1925), C.B. (1902). Born 5 June 1861. Deputy-Chairman of the Board of Customs (by 1925 Customs and Excise) from 1904 till, at any rate, 1925. He died 1941.

He married in 1891 Anna Mary née Fremantle (II4), daughter of The Very Rev. The Hon. W. H. Fremantle, Dean of Ripon.

There was issue, *see below*.

(iii) ADMIRAL SIR JOHN FRANKLIN PARRY (II5), K.C.B., F.R.G.S. Born 15 August 1863. He married in 1893 Emily Lempriere née Dobson (II6), daughter of the Hon. Henry Dobson, then Premier of Tasmania. Died 1926.

(iv) ISABEL EMMELINE née Parry (II5A), married Rev. Ernest L. Ridge.

(v-vii) Two sons and a daughter, names not given in pedigree.

There was issue, *see below*.

GENERATION IX

Issue of Sir Frederick Sydney Parry (II3) and Anna Mary née Fremantle (II4), his wife.

(i) REAR-ADMIRAL WILLIAM EDWARD PARRY, R.N. (II7). Born 8 April 1893. As Captain Parry he was lent to the New Zealand Division in 1939, and was in command of the cruiser, H.M.S. *Achilles*, in the Battle of the River

Plate, fought on 13 December 1939, which led to the inglorious end of the German battleship, the *Graf Spee*. He was then created a C.B., and from 1940 to 1942 he held the rank of Commodore whilst First Naval Member of the New Zealand Navy Board. He was promoted Rear-Admiral 8 January 1944. He married in 1922 Maude Mary *née* Phillips (118) by whom he had issue, *see below*.

(ii) KATHARINE ISABEL *née* Parry (119), born 1894. Married Arthur Basil Blagdon (120), by whom she had 6 children.

Issue of Vice-Admiral Sir John Franklin Parry (115) (of Generation VIII), and Emily Lempriere, née Dobson (116), his wife.

JOAN WINIFRED *née* Parry (121), born 1894, married Robert Hunt (122), by whom she had 2 children.

GENERATION X

Issue of Rear-Admiral William Edward Parry, R.N. (117) (of Generation IX) and Maude Mary née Phillips (118) his wife.

- (i) PETER EDWARD PARRY (123), born 1923, twin of
- (ii) ANN KATHARINE *née* Parry (124).

I have now concluded a tale spreading over three centuries and I am hopeful that it may be regarded as an interesting as well as helpful contribution to the history of the County of Gloucester. I am most grateful to Rear-Admiral W. E. Parry (117) for the information he has given me.*

SUPPLEMENT

DIX, ROBERTS AND SMITH

I have already shown under Generation III that two Hillier brothers—William Hillier (18) (*c.* 1692–1750) and Anthony Hillier (20) (*ob.* 1748)—married two Dix sisters, of the respective names: Elizabeth *née* Dix (19) (*ob.* 1740) and Hannah *née* Dix (21) (*c.* 1704–1747–8). It will have been seen that amongst the legatees of William Hillier (18) was ‘Mr John Roberts’, whom he also appointed as one of his executors, and that amongst the legatees of Anthony Hillier (20) were Mrs Abigail Smith and Mrs Susannah Roberts.

The identification of these three persons and, in particular, of the two last, may well give an added interest as a closing note. Of the two last let me take Mrs Susannah Roberts first as being the elder of the two, and in passing let me give some few details concerning the issue of their respective marriages.

MRS SUSANNAH ROBERTS was Susannah *née* Dix, who was born *c.* 1702, being the third daughter and fifth child of Thomas Dix of Cirencester, ironmonger, already mentioned above on page 216, whose Will, dated 24 April 1742, was proved in PCC on 4 August 1744. At some date after 8 April 1732 and before 1735 she married John Roberts, born *c.* 1712, of Cirencester, ironmonger. She died on 3 or 23 October 1778 and was buried in BGPC (‘aged 76’): MI to her there—which, however, incorrectly gives her age as ‘72’—as follows:—

‘Here rest the remains of Susanna the wife of John Roberts, and third daughter of Thomas Dix, formerly of this place, who died October the third, 1778, aged 72’.

The burial entry gives the date of her death as 23 October 1778. He survived her and dying on 8 January 1795, aged 82, was buried in BGPC: MI to him there as follows:—

' Underneath this stone are inter'd the remains of John Roberts, (of this place), Ironmonger, who died January the 8th, 1795, aged 82 '.

His Will, dated 23 April 1793, and Codicil thereto, dated 7 January 1795, were proved together in London on 1 July 1795.

Their second child, Sarah *née* Roberts, bap. CPC 24 August 1737, married there on 11 January 1769 John Smith (born *c.* 1730) of Aylesbury, co. Bucks. and afterwards of Cirencester and a J.P. for co. Gloucester. He died 3 August 1795, aged 65, and was buried in BGPC : MI to him there as follows :—

' Here rest the remains of John Smith, formerly of Aylesbury in the County of Bucks., Esq., but many years resident in this place, and one of His Majesty's Justices of the Peace for the County of Gloucester. He died the third day of August, 1795, aged 65 '.

His Will, dated 24 April 1793, together with Codicil thereto, dated 4 October 1794, was proved on 27 October 1795. She survived him and dying 21 April 1805, aged 67, was buried in BGPC : MI to her there as follows :—

' Sarah Smith, widow of John Smith, Esq. Ob. 21st April, A.D. 1805, Ad., (*sic.* for Aged) 67 '.

John Smith and Sarah *née* Roberts, his wife, were the parents of Thomas Smith, born at Cirencester, *c.* 1770, of Easton Grey, near Malmesbury, co. Wilts, J.P., who dying without issue 31 May 1822, aged 52, was buried in BGPC : MI to him there as follows :—

' Sacred to the Memory of Thomas Smith, of Easton Grey, in the County of Wilts., Esq., who died on the 31st May 1822, aged 52 '.

His Will, dated 19 March 1817 and the Codicil thereto dated 29 October 1820 were proved together PCC on 2 July 1822.

He married Eliza (also called Elizabeth) *née* Chandler, who was born *c.* 1776, daughter of Richard Chandler of

Gloucester, and who, long surviving her husband, died 6 January 1859, aged 92, and was buried in BGPC.

This Thomas Smith, J.P., was a rather remarkable man, an intimate friend of that well-known and most interesting and delightful personality of that time, John Whishaw, as also of the forceful and purposeful Rev. Thomas Belsham so well remembered in connection with the first Nonconformist Academy in Hackney, Middlesex, which was founded in 1786 and whereof he was a Professor. He was himself known as 'The Mæcenas of his Neighbourhood'. A full account of him will be found in my article entitled 'The Seat and Manor of Easton Grey, co. Wilts, and Thomas Smith, J.P., "The Mæcenas of his Neighbourhood"', which was published in *The Wiltshire Gazette* of 5 July 1934. It will be seen therefrom that, subject to a life-interest for his wife, he left Easton Grey and his other estates to his first cousin (*ex parte materna* only) the hereinafter mentioned Richard Smith, the elder son of the hereinafter mentioned Thomas Smith.

The third child of John Roberts and Susannah *née* Dix, his wife, was Ann ('Nancy') *née* Roberts, bap. at CPC 11 October 1739, who married there on 29 November 1770 her first cousin the hereinafter mentioned Thomas Smith, born *c.* 1737, the only child of Rev. Skinner Smith and Abigail *née* Dix (*see below*), his wife. Her death and place of burial will be found recorded when I come to deal with him.

MRS ABIGAIL SMITH was Abigail *née* Dix, who was born *c.* 1706, being the fifth daughter and seventh and youngest child of the same Thomas Dix of Cirencester, ironmonger. In or about 1736 she married the Rev. Skinner Smith, eldest child of the Rev. Jeremiah Smith (*c.* 1653-1723) who was admitted at Corpus Christi College, Cambridge as 'Jeremiah Smith of Kent' in 1671 and who is well remembered as 'The Champion of the Trinity' in 1719 and concerning whom and whose ancestry, as also concerning

his issue and descendants, reference may be made to my articles in *Notes and Queries* of 3 and 10 November 1934 and 6 November 1943. The Rev. Skinner Smith was Minister of the Congregation of Gosditch Street in Cirencester from 1727 to 1730, whereafter he removed to Abingdon, co. Berks.

His Will, dated 9 November 1744, wherein he described himself as then ' of Abingdon, co. Berks ', was proved in PCC on 11 November 1748. The precise date of his death and his place of burial are alike unknown to me. His widow returned to her native Cirencester and survived him by some 35 years. Her Will, dated 26 September 1764, wherein she described herself as then of Cirencester, was proved in PCC on 11 December 1783.

She died 1 November 1783, aged 77, and was buried in BGPC on 6 November 1783: MI to her there as follows:—

' Here also are inter'd the remains of Abigail the widow of the Rev. Skinner Smith, formerly of Abingdon in the County of Berks., and fifth daughter of Thomas Dix. She died Nov. the 1st, 1783, aged 77 '.

For their issue and descendants reference may be made to the above-mentioned article in *Notes and Queries* of 3 and 10 November 1934, as also to that in *The Wiltshire Gazette* of 5 July 1934. I must content myself here with the statement that their only child was Thomas Smith, born *c.* 1737, who was a coal-merchant in London and who in 1797–8 was Renter-Warden of the Leathersellers Company of the City of London.

This Thomas Smith married CPC on 29 November 1770—as already stated—his first cousin, the above-mentioned Ann (' Nancy ') *née* Roberts. He died 25 January 1802, aged 65, and was buried at Bunhill Fields, London. His said wife survived him, and dying 8 December 1811, aged 73, was there buried with him.

His Will, dated 20 March 1801, was proved in PCC on 6 February 1802.

Their issue included two sons namely:—

(a) RICHARD SMITH (1774-1847), already mentioned above on page 235 as Devisee of the seat and Manor of Easton Grey, co. Wilts., one of the leading solicitors of his time in London and head of the London firm of solicitors known to-day as Messrs Janson, Cobb, Pearson & Co., and from 1846 until his death Master of the Leathersellers Company, who by Marilla *née* Graham (c. 1780-1-1837), his second wife, daughter of Alexander Graham (c. 1734-1802), a lineal descendant of the illustrious James Graham, first and 'great' Marquis of Montrose (1612-1650), left issue, including a son, Graham Smith (1812-1871) of Easton Grey, co. Wilts., J.P., who married Elizabeth *née* Tyssen (*ob.* 1870), and a daughter, Susan *née* Smith (1810-1887), who married John Baily, (1805-1877), the eminent Chancery Q.C.; and

(b) CHARLES SMITH (1782-1846), of Marston Maisey, Wilts., where, as already shown on page 227, he was residing on 13 December 1838, and later of Down Ampney, near Cirencester, coal-merchant, and in 1842-3 Master of the Leathersellers Company, who married Mary Ann *née* Wheeler (1807-1893), by whom he left issue including a daughter, Susan *née* Smith (1832-1913) who married Alfred Collier (1822-1887), such two having issue, including Alfred Thomas Collier, late Master of the Leathersellers Company, Frederick G. Charles Smith—whose widow married, secondly, Frederick Collier, an elder brother of the said Alfred Collier—was buried in BGPC, where the pleasing MI to him runs as follows :—

' Under this tomb, surrounded by the ashes of many of his ancestors and relatives are deposited the mortal remains of Charles Smith, late of Down Ampney in the County of Gloucestershire, Esquire, who departed this life on the 28th day of August 1846 in the 66th year of his age '.
