THE PAUNCEFOTES OF HASFIELD, AN ADDENDUM<sup>1</sup>

From transcripts, compiled by E. J. L. Cole (1953), of original documents in custody of the County Records Officer:—

No date (*ante* 1290). Grant by Grimbald Pancevot, son of Grimbald Pancevot, lord of Hasfeld, to Margerie, daughter of Henry Warinder, of one messuage in Hasfelde with the house built thereon and with a curtilage adjacent which is situated near the highway opposite the messuage formerly of Henry Humfray, also common rights as pertain to all free tenants there, rendering 12*d* at four terms, viz. Lady Day 3*d*, Nativity of St. John Baptist 3*d*, Michaelmas 3*d*, St. Andrew 3*d*. Margery has given four shillings for this grant. Witnesses: Master Geoffrey le Arblaster, William le Arewesmith, Peter de Thoune, John Underhulle, William Goodrich, William Bulung, and many others.

December 1341. Grant by William Savage to Nicholas Underhul of one parcel of arable land in Hasfeld, in breadth between the land of Thomas Underhul and the land of William Salemon, and in length extending from the land of William Salemon as far as the land of lady Clemence Pauncefot . . . Hasfeld, Sunday after St. Lucy the Virgin, 15 Edw. III.

March 1343. Grant by Walter Prat of Hasfeld to Sir William Wyggemor of Hasfeld, of one parcel of his meadow lying in Wydinhemme near a place called Grimshurste, extending in length from the meadow of the lady Clemencie Pauncefot on the south as far as the meadow of the said Clemence on the north, and in breadth between a meadow formerly of William Wyggemor on the east side, and the meadow of John Elyot on the west . . . Hasfeld, Sunday after Annunciation B.V.M., 17 Edw. III.

14 February 1350. 'Lady Clemence Paunsséfot' occurs in a grant made at 'Hasfeld, Sunday the feast of St. Valentine, 25 Edw. III.'

May 1355. 'Quitclaim by Clemencia daughter of the former William Salemon—Hasfeld, Sunday after Invention of the Holy Cross, 29 Edw. III.'

25 December 1373. 'Grant by John Wyggemore of Wykrugge, senior,' mentions 'the land of Sir Gimbald Pauncefot.' Hasfeld, Sunday the feast of Our Lord's Nativity, 47 Edw. III.

3 March 1455. Grant by Thomas Gylbart and Alice his wife to Richard Beauchamp, arm., Henry Pauncefot, arm., John Hayward, Thomas Payne and John Guage, of all lands in township of Cors, Eldrisfeld, and Trynley, which came to Alice after the death of John Wygmor her uncle. Witnesses: Thomas Pauncefot, John Delamare, John Botyllar of Cors, Thomas Wodley, and many others. Cors, 3 March, 33 Henry VI.

*Cal. Inq. p.m., Edw. III*, vol. XIV, no. 188 (1952). Gimbald Pauncefot, knt. Hereford, Inq. 4 Jan. 49 Edw. III (1376.) Gimbald died on 20 November, 49 Edw. III (1375), and Hugh his brother, aged 40 years and more, and Katherine his wife still living. Hugh de Carreu, aged 40 years and more, is the next heir of Gimbald; and the said Hugh, brother of Gimbald, is the next heir of Emery. Emery died in 8 Edw. III (1334) and Gimbald entered on the manor (of Couwarne). Ellen, daughter of Alan de Charleton, Knt., died without issue by Gimbald.

## A GLOUCESTERSHIRE COOKERY BOOK

Mrs Boazman of Millrigg, Temple Sowerby, Westmorland, has in her possession a leather bound book, 8 inches by 6 inches, which bears on the flyleaf 'Annabella Guise her Book Anno Dni 1694.' There are 260 pages on which recipes are written, including an index.

From internal evidence it is clear that Annabella was the daughter of Sir John Guise, Bart., of Elmore, and the wife of Edward Blount. (*These Trans.* III, 72).

At page 244 is a 'Receipt for the Rickets' with a note: 'My Grandmother Cecilia Guise taught my mother this receipt which cured my Br Sr. John Guise at two years old of a dangerous Ricket and has been often since aproved by my mother, E.G.' Below is another note: 'Often aprovd with succes by me, A. Blount'
